
## Section Officer. Stella Rogers. W.A.A.F. ROGERS. S. is named on the Saltash WW2 Memorial.

An article in the 30<sup>th</sup> December 1948 Cornish Guardian gives Christian names to some of those named on the Saltash Borough World War Two Memorial: including a Stella Rogers. The Saltash and District Branch of the Royal British Legion 'Roll of Honour' also includes the name 'Stella Rogers'.

Though I think Stella is the Rogers. S. on the WW2 memorial she is not 'Commemorated in perpetuity' (named) by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission as a WW2 casualty.

St. Stephen's burial records show that: a Stella Rogers was buried at St. Stephens on 21<sup>st</sup> June 1945. Age 37. Her address at the time of death was St. Barnabas Hospital. Saltash. *I have found a grave in St. Stephens Churchyard with a headstone that says:* 


"IN MEMORY OF STELLA ROGERS (LATE SECTION OFFICER W.A.A.F.) DEARLY LOVED DAUGHTER OF THE REV. AND MRS SIDNEY J. ROGERS. DIED JUNE 17TH 1945 "NOT SOMEHOW, BUT TRIUMPHANTLY"

Stella Rogers gravestone has information about her parents and of another ancestor. *An inscribed tablet cover on her grave says:* 

IN MEMORY OF SIDNEY JOHN ROGERS WESLEY METHODIST MINISTER DIED 19<sup>TH</sup> AUGUST 1962 A DECENDANT OF THE REVEREND JOHN ROGERS M.D. CANON OF ST. PAULS WHO WAS BURNED AT SMITHFIELD FOR HIS PART IN TRANSLATING THE BIBLE INTO ENGLISH "IN MY HAND NO PRIDE I BRING SIMPLY TO THE CROSS I CLING" ALSO OF **EMILY HOUGHTUM ROGERS** WIFE OF THE ABOVE WHO ENTERED ETERNAL REST 27<sup>TH</sup> DECEMBER 1964 IN JOY REUNITED.
